7. Description:

This house was estimated to have been built in 1900 according to the Clayton County Assessor. Sanborn Maps show that it was constructed between publication of maps in 1902 and 1913. A newspaper account from October 26, 1905 indicates that the Methodist-Episcopal Parsonage was in place at that time. The house's form and detailing are consistent with a date of ca. 1905.

The Methodist-Episcopal Parsonage at 109 Cedar Street NW is an example of a vernacular Gable-Front-and-Wing residential form. It has a limestone foundation and the frame walls were originally clad in wood clapboard siding. The house has a T-shaped plan with a right-hand ell containing a hipped roof entrance porch. The original porch filled the entire ell but the current one has only at the entrance. The shallow left-hand ell now contains an exterior staircase leading to the second floor apartment. The intersecting gable roof has a moderate pitch with medium width eaves. A scroll-cut and spindled gable ornamentation fills both the front and west gable peaks. The building has asbestos shingle or Transite siding with no other ornamentation. The entrance porch has a non-original balustrade composed of geometric patterns.

Fenestration includes 1/1 double-hung windows with the feature window a cottage window on the first floor, front-gable wing. It has geometric patterned leaded glass lights in the upper sash. Small single-light square sash are located in the gable peaks with either single or double double-hung windows on the side walls and gabled ends of the upper and lower levels. The other primary change is the reduced size of the west side porch and the addition of a shed-roofed carport, also on the west side.

8. Significance:

The Methodist-Episcopal Parsonage at 109 Cedar Street NW is one of only a handful of extant residences in the Elkader Downtown Historic District. The district derives significance under both Criteria A and C. Under Criterion A, the district's buildings are associated with the historic contexts developed for the downtown in the "Architectural and Historical Resources of the Elkader Downtown Historic District" Multiple Property Documentation form covering the years 1846 to 1960. Under Criterion A, the building is a contributing resource as the only example of a church-owned property used to house the ministers for both the Methodist-Episcopal Church and the Friedens Evangelical Church between ca. 1905 and 1924. The house is also significant as a contributing resource under Criterion C as an example of a vernacular residential form typical of the late 19th and early 20th centuries found in the Elkader Downtown Historic District.

Elkader Downtown Historic District Background:

The town of Elkader was laid out in 1846 along the banks of the Turkey River approximately 16 miles upstream from the Turkey River's confluence with the Mississippi River. The town was surveyed and laid out in 1846 with the Original Town Plat filed in June 22, 1846by Timothy Davis, Chester Sage and John Thompson, friends and business partners, who began operating a sawmill on North Front (Main) Street in 1845 before the town was even platted. By 1849 they had a successful flour mill in operation. The new town was named for Abd el-Kader, an Algerian freedom fighter and world figure who was admired by Davis. The principal building stimulating development in the 1840s and 1850s was the

Elkader Mill. After 1860 when the Clayton County voters selected Elkader as the permanent county seat, the downtown saw a variety of merchants set up shops, several hotels open, a number of newspapers begin publication, and small manufacturing concerns get underway in the city center. Elkader numbered 440 residents in 1860.

The new county court house saw its first section completed in 1869 opposite the downtown. New limestone buildings were erected along both North and South Main Street with public halls frequently located on upper floors. During the 1870s and 1880s 2-story brick buildings began replacing frame business houses. A permanent railroad connection was completed by the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul RR in 1886 but service remained poor as Elkader was located at the end of a spur rather than along a main line route. A more important transportation improvement during the 1880s was the completion of the Keystone Bridge across the Turkey River in 1880. Its completion prompted a period of economic vitality and community investment. The community was officially incorporated two years later in 1891 and a new waterworks system and city well were completed in 1896. Electricity was rejected by locals until the end of the decade in 1900, however. In the meantime, new churches were built in 1897 for the Congregationalists on the east side of the river and in 1897-1899 for the Catholics on the west side of the river Coupled with a series of major fires during the 1890s, the downtown saw a period of rebuilding with a new hotel and bank at the entrance to the business district at the turn of the century. The new opera house was completed on North Main Street while other 2 and 3-story brick blocks appeared both north and south of Bridge Street.

By 1900, Elkader's population stood at its peak of 1,321 – an increase of 77 percent during the decade of the 1890s. Development continued in the downtown before and after World War I but at a much slower pace. Floods and fires damaged the Elkader Mill in 1902, 1906 and 1908, but it was nevertheless rebuilt by Schmidt Brothers & Co., retaining a key employer and anchor for Elkader's downtown. The business district began to extend to the west before and after the war with the principal changes seen along West Bridge Street. Here livery stables and wagon shops were replaced by automobile dealerships, implement companies and filling stations. Five stations eventually located along West Bridge with a sixth one block to the south along First Street SW. The national economic depression of the 1930s was coupled by the closing of the Elkader Mill in 1939 following a major fire. Natural disasters after World War I included major floods in 1922, 1947, and 1958 with a tornado destroying section of South Main Street in 1958 as well.

Despite these natural and human made disasters, Elkader saw steady but modest population growth from 1,223 in 1920 to 1,526 in 1960. The impact of the automobile was seen in traffic patterns, parking patterns, and traffic signs and the introduction of electricity saw several generations of street lighting come and go. The popularity of the opera house waned and the first floor became the municipal fire station while two movie houses came and one stayed in the downtown drawing evening crowds for entertainment and shopping. As many as 130 people resided in downtown flats during this period. A good system of inter and intra-state highways connected Elkader and its downtown to other parts of the state and country in a way that railroads had never served the community. By 1960, downtown Elkader was well-established as one of several geographically dispersed retail centers serving Clayton County. Virtually every storefront was filled with start-up businesses or multi-generational family stores as Elkader's downtown achieved a stable and healthy status for local and countywide residents.

Historic Background for the Methodist-Episcopal Parsonage at 109 Cedar Street NW:

This residence was constructed as a parsonage for the Methodist-Episcopal Church sometime between August 1902 and October 1905. These dates are based on the date for the 1902 Sanborn Map that shows the property without the parsonage in place and an October 26, 1905 newspaper account of the parsonage being occupied by Charles Scovel. Both the Methodist-Episcopal Church and parsonage were sold to the Friedens Evangelical Church in May 1906 according to a newspaper account at the time of the sale. In October 1906, the local paper noted that Rev. F. Leonhard of the was moving into the parsonage of the "German Church."

A summary of newspaper articles related to the two churches from 1898 to 1923 taken from research compiled by the Elkader County Historical Society/Carter House Museum volunteers appears below:

1898 - March 3: Unknown source

Law suit between Henry Schoch and George W. Schoch; referred by Anton Kramer. Property sold for \$1200 to trustees of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Lot 8, minus a strip 20' wide off the east end, parallel to the alley. Possibly could be 107 Cedar NW across from the Register office, the original school house on the west side.

- May 12: Regular services were held at the church.
- May 19: Memorial services were held at National and Farmersburg.
- May 26: M.E. Church being moved.

June 2: "There will be no session of the Union Sunday School owning to the Methodist Church is on the move."

June 23: "Mr. Davis expects to have the Methodist Episcopal Church on its new location by Saturday, (June 25th). It has been a heavy burden for his outfit."

December 15: Elkader Register

Methodist Episcopal secured first building in 1869 – a schoolhouse. But the present building was started in 1869 and took several years to complete; moved the summer of 1898; added a basement and was brick veneered.

1905 – October 5: Paper Unknown

Rev. E. Leonhard of Shelby, Iowa, arrived here Sat., and is to have charge of the Lutheran Congregation at Elkader. He will hold services every Sunday morning at 11:00 o'clock in the M.E. Church. Mr. Leonhard has rented Mrs. Borman's new house.

October 12: Paper Unknown

Rev. G. W. Durham, the new pastor, will occupy the M.E. church pulpit next Sunday evening at 7:30 – all are cordially invited to attend.

October 26: Paper Unknown

Chas. Scovel has moved into the M.E. parsonage.

December 31: Ruth Grau's *History of Peace Church* Friedens Evangelical Church of Elkader organized.

1906 - April 5: The Register

The officers of the German Church are making an effort to raise about \$2500 for the purpose of purchasing and improving the M.E. Church and parsonage. We learn that they are meeting with success thus far, having secured pledges for nearly \$1500. It is thought they may build if they do not secure the M.E. Church.

April 19: The Register

At a meeting of the members of the M.E. Church last evening it was unanimously voted to accept the proposition of the trustees of the Lutheran Society to purchase the M.E. Church and parsonage at \$2000. The sale is to be arranged by the trustees.

May 17: The Register

On Monday, the Methodist Church property was transferred to the trustees of the German Evangelical Society by Mr. Preston – paid a portion of the \$2000.

May 31: Paper Unknown

Wm. Walter is painting the German Church.

October 4: Paper Unknown

Rev. F. Leonhard is moving into the parsonage of the German Church.

October 18: The Register

The German congregation is having the large basement of the church building fitted up for a S.S. room and Rev. Lionhard expects to start a confirmation class soon.

October 25: The Register Basement completed.

1908 - June 4: The Register and Argus

Rev. Lionhard, pastor of the German Church, left for Colorado. He left for health reasons.

July 2: Register and Argus

The parsonage of the German Church is being fitted up for the new pastor, Rev. C.H. Franke of Burlington, Iowa. Mr. Franke expects to be here with his family and to occupy the pulpit of the church on the 19th.

1909 – May 20: Paper Unknown – Register and Argus?

The trustees of the German Church have purchased the Argus building opposite this office for \$800. It adjoins the church property and they expect to use it for school purposes.


